Environmental Justice and Museums

Ten Ways That Racial And Environmental Justice Are Inextricably Linked

Cities across the United States and Europe have been reflecting on the unprecedented protests demanding greater racial justice following the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis on 25 May. This has sparked a deeper conversation around the world among companies, universities, religious institutions, museums who have historic links to racial injustice and slavery. Given the significance of 19 June (Juneteenth), many companies and organizations have also been quick to sign up to pledges around racial justice. However, the response among the environmental community has been more muted and nuanced, given the complex relationship between the modern environmental movement and race relations. National Geographic famously addressed its own historic coverage of race in a special edition two years ago.

Barrio Logan has faced environmental racism for generations. We want justice.

I live in Barrio Logan, a historically BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Color) community. Beginning in the 1920s, Chicanx, Mexican, Black and Asian populations moved here, lured by bayfront industry jobs and affordable housing. Our community thrived — people canned tuna, brewed beers, built homes and churches, swam in the bay. In the 1960s, racist land use policies began to decimate our neighborhood and endanger our families with pollution.

Other communities of color had organized to oppose environmental threats before **Warren County**. In the early 1960s, Latino farm workers led by **Cesar Chavez** fought for workplace rights, including protection from harmful pesticides in the farm fields of California's San Joaquin Valley. In 1967, African-American students took to the streets of **Houston** to oppose a city garbage dump in their community that had claimed the life of a child. In 1968, residents of **West Harlem**, in New York City, fought unsuccessfully against a sewage treatment plant in their community. But the Warren County protests marked the first instance of an environmental protest by people of color garnering **widespread national attention**.
